

LIGHT MOVESOPENING PERFORMANCE



OPENING RECEPTION AND PERFORMANCEIN PARTNERSHIP WITH DANCE LIMERICK

FORECASTING is a performance of one actress and her laptop. It is based on a collection of amateur videos taken from the world's largest video-sharing website: YouTube. The screen becomes the site of intersection between the performer and the two-dimensional world of images that represent other people in other places. The result is a dizzying hybrid experience, the nature of videos ranging between funny and banal, to ingenious and poetic, to gruesome and violent.

The videos used in Forecasting were recorded by ordinary people, they are a record of how they chose to represent their world, what they like, what they think they are good at and what they care about. The artists' intention is to use these snippets of staged reality as a window into humanity at this point in history, when anyone can use the internet, a computer and a camera as tools for self-narration. Technological evolution can provoke our thoughts, mental and physical habits and the way we think about our body. After years of clicking on interfaces, objects in the world do not appear the same anymore.



MAN WITH A MOVIE CAMERA

Accompanied by a live score composed by Neil O'Connor and Dunk Murphy Performed by Neil O'Connor and Dunk Murphy

Since its release in 1929, Dziga Vertov's masterpiece documentary has endured as one of cinema's greatest achievements. Vertov imagined a way of seeing that could transcend the human eye, and in doing so created the foundation for the language of cinema. Few films introduced the unique possibilities of film so completely, demonstrating techniques and effects that remain central to contemporary cinema and repeatedly earning it the title as the greatest documentary film ever made. Set in Odessa, Kiev and Moscow, the film is simultaneously an exploration of the chaos of urban movement as it is an examination of the relationship between cinema and reality.

Its depiction of a society fresh from revolution captures a profound dynamism of city and people and transforms daily routine into a cinematographic poem.

As a silent film, Man With a Movie Camera has become an enticing challenge to many composers lured by its inherent musicality, rhythm and embrace of abstraction. Light Moves is delighted to present a new commissioned music

score created especially for the festival by two of Ireland's most innovative musical voices, Dunk Murphy and Neil O'Connor. Both artists, known for their significant body of work that spans experimental music, music for concert audiences as well as music for film, will perform this new commission live.

Dunk Murphy

Dunk Murphy is also known as **Sunken Foal** and a member of one of Ireland's most influential electronic music groups **Ambulance**. His work focuses on sound design, composition for film and gallery installations. Championed by BBC1/XFM DJ Mary Anne Hobbs, Today FM's Donal Dineen and the late John Peel, Dunk's music showcases a keen ear for a unique sound and compelling melody. He regularly arranges instrumentation for singers Glen Hansard, David Kitt and Carol Keogh.

Neil O'Connor

As Somadrone and a member of The Redneck Manifesto, composer Neil O'Connor has toured in Europe, USA, Australia and Japan. His work has been shown/performed at Resonances Festival - IRCAM Paris, Institute of Contemporary Art, London and he has held residencies at the Massachusetts Museum of Modern Art and the Swedish institute of Electro-Acoustic Music Stockholm and has worked alongside the Bang on a Can Ensemble and David Crowell (Phillip Glass Ensemble). Neil is currently lecturing at the Digital Media Arts Research Centre at the University of Limerick.



ALL THESE SLEEPLESS NIGHTS

I think everybody has their own natural state of dance they are in...Dance is one of the devices that tells the story...It's all about finding the natural rhythm of your body, you kind of discover yourself. - Director Michał Marczak.

In a film that blurs the line between fiction and documentary, *All These Sleepless Nights* captures protagonists Christopher and Michal's own natural state of dance as they navigate their way through the party scene in Warsaw, Poland.

Showing us all the crazy splendour of youth, Michal Marczak creates an indelible portrait of friendship and romance. A new era is coming, and Warsaw stands uncomfortably at its edge. Christopher and Michal restlessly roam their city's streets in search of living forever inside the beautiful moment. Never content with answers, they push each experience to its breaking point, testing what it might mean to be truly awake in a world that seems satisfied to be asleep. *Polish (with English subtitles)*.



DANCE GOES ON

2017 | Hong Kong | 1'20"36 Director: Stanley Wong Choreographer: Hugh Cho

Dance Goes On is award winning artist, designer and photographer Stanley Wong's first feature length film. Exploring Hong Kong, life and ageing, *Dance Goes On* builds upon the long friendship between Wong and Hong Kong veteran dance makers Xing Liang, Mui Cheuk-yin and Yuri Ng. It is a discovery of the nature of dance and the city they love through its people, spaces and objects.

As a fundamentally Hong Kong artist, Stanley Wong (aka anothermountainman) often engages in social issues related to his hometown. His renowned *redwhiteblue* series, which represented Hong Kong at the 51st Venice Biennale in 2005, explored the changing material culture of that city. His installation artwork *Impermanence* won the Hong Kong Contemporary Art Award 2012. Wong has exhibited, lectured and taught internationally, and his art can be found in many collections, including Deutsche Bank Collection (Hong Kong), Hong Kong Museum of Art, Groninger Museum (The Netherlands) and Victoria & Albert Museum (UK).

In an age of proximity to machines, neuroscientists are Gingerella's guide as we journey through the urban Amazon, Brazil, Iceland and the UK, exploring how we move and what it is to be close to each other. Today, with arduous migrations, Brexit and communities struggling to cooperate, her journey reveals some startling, cognitive truths about why we dance together.

FINNCYCLING-SOUMI-PERKELE! VOLUME 2



FinnCycling-Soumi-Perkele! dives into the dark side of Finland. It is a combination of politics, dark humour and protest rap in a form of an indoor cycling exercise: one woman's gritty protest against all-male austerity politics. The director of the work has had enough. She serves as a fitness instructor in the workout program and the message is clear: "Yes, You Can-NOT take this anymore!"

Experience this film installation first hand, mimicking the protagonist's actions on your exercise bike!







Based on his ongoing research how the Greek moiroloi (lamentations) can be used as a template to look at contemporary art practices that deal with mourning and grief, Guy Cools will offer a short lecture and workshop in creative writing.

The living, oral tradition of the moiroloi is not only used to mourn the death, but the same, improvised songs are also used in the context of weddings (to say goodbye to the bride leaving her family) or to dialogue with those who are in exile (Greek: xenitia).

The moiroloi are by nature theatrical and dramatic in the way the singer addresses the absent person and temporarily lends him her voice to answer back: a widow talks to her husband, a mother to her married daughter, a corpse to its own 'tired body'. In the lecture and workshop we will explore the antiphonic structure of the Greek laments to dialogue with those who are absent in our own lives.

The lecture/workshop will also be used to introduce and frame the work of the Canadian visual artist, Laura Taler, who will present a lecture/performance about her work directly after this lecture and workshop. (See page 23 for details).

Guy Cools is a dance dramaturge. Recent positions include Associate Research Professor at the research institute Arts in Society of the Fontys School of Fine and Performing Arts in Tilburg, and Postdoctoral Researcher at Ghent University, where he finished a practice-based PhD on the relationship between dance and writing. He has worked as a dance critic, artistic programmer, and policymaker for dance in Flanders. He now dedicates himself to production dramaturgy, contributing to work by choreographers all over Europe and Canada. He regularly lectures and publishes, and has developed a series of workshops that aim to support artists and choreographers in their creative process. With the Canadian choreographer, Lin Snelling, he developed an improvised performance practice 'Rewriting Distance' that focuses on the integration of movement, voice, and writing.

TALK / PERFORMANCE - THIS IS HOW I'D LIKE TO DIE

Laura Taler

In October 2017 I travelled to Romania, the country of my birth, to perform and film myself singing an Argentinean song in my grandmother's house where I used to visit as a child. I wore a long wig over my short hair and costumed myself in peasant garb so successfully that my grandmother's neighbour proclaimed, "You look just like us!" Although I was pleased at the authenticity of my costume I was also filled with shame because after a few short days, when my film shoot was complete, I would leave the poor village and return to my Canadian life of privilege. Even though I was born in Romania and lived there until I was six I felt like I was playing dress-up, appropriating a culture to which I may never have belonged.

This artist talk looks at my recent body of work to question why I have chosen performative activities that, for me, conflate discomfort and fear with familiarity and desire. And how consequently, I have begun to understand aspects of my practice as performing mourning. In addition to the Argentinean song in my grandmother's house in Romania, I will discuss recent videos where I perform a Romanian song in a German forest, and a series of Tai Chi gestures on a beach. -Laura Taler

Laura Taler began her career as a contemporary dance choreographer before turning her attention to filmmaking and visual art. Throughout her career Taler has explored the links between movement, memory, and history by using cinematic and choreographic devices to articulate how the body is able to carry the past without being oppressed by it. She has been a resident at the Banff Centre for the Arts, Centro Cultural Recoleta (Buenos Aires), Carleton Immersive Media Studio (Ottawa), and a fellow at the Institute for Cultural Inquiry (Berlin). Her work has been screened in festivals, exhibitions, and broadcast internationally.







Human practices, rhythms, and habits are all being changed by the hyper-presence of screens: we choreograph them as they choreograph us. It is now primarily through screens that we access and experience culture, information, and ideas. I like to imagine the actions and gestures of humans with and on screens as a site for choreographic thinking and discovery. I imagine drawing attention to the movements, timings and spaces that characterize our interfaces with screens. Indeed, this word – interface or "between faces" – speaks to the heart of this presentation. What is the choreographic potential of this between? – Simon Ellis

Simon Ellis is a dance artist originally from New Zealand but now living in London. His recent choreographies are 'Pause. Listen' (2014, with Chisato Ohno and Jackie Shemesh), 'We Record Ourselves' (2016, with Katrina McPherson, Natalia Barua, and Owa Barua), and 'We Like Lists Because We Don't Want to Die' (2017, with Shannon Bott). He also works closely with Colin Poole as 'Colin, Simon and I', and their latest presentation-performance is 'No Conflict Here' (2018). He is interested in the limits and possibilities of collaboration in choreographic processes, and in video and moving images as choreographic encounters. Simon co-edits the International Journal of Screendance with Harmony Bench

For several years Davies has been collecting images, photographs and texts from the visual arts, science, personal collections and other sources. Printing the images on transparent paper and laying them side-by-side, Davies recalls the origins, ideas and connections between these visual materials and herself.

For the first time, Davies is opening up this previously private process to visitors of Light Moves. Over the weekend you are invited to join Siobhan to observe, question and discuss as she works with the images.

Siobhan Davies is Artistic Director of Siobhan Davies Dance and a renowned British choreographer who rose to prominence in the 1970s. Davies was a founding member of **London Contemporary** Dance Theatre and in 1982 joined forces with Richard Alston and Ian Spink to create independent dance company Second Stride. She works closely with collaborating artists to ensure that their own artistic enquiry is part of the creative process.

By 2002 she moved away from the traditional theatre circuit and started making work for gallery spaces. Davies applies choreography across a wide range of creative disciplines including visual arts and film.

Over the weekend Siobhan will present 2 events as part of Transparencies, an **Open Studio** where groups and individuals are invited to observe and participate in the work-in-progress project Transparencies and an **Artist Talk** where she will discuss the process of the Open Studio and her work more broadly.



PRESENTATION AND INTERVIEW: PRACTICES AND PROCESSES OF COLLABORATION

Annie Pfingst and Helen Poynor

in Memoriam (page 16), an environmental dance film on the theme of loss, is the result of a twenty-year collaboration between movement artist Helen Poynor and visual artist Annie Pfingst which includes site-specific performances and installations in Australia, the UK and Java.

Their collaborative practice is grounded in a shared understanding of the moving body and of place. The in-depth working process, that includes kinaesthetic and visual research on site and open scoring, is predicated on a responsive partnership with the site that embraces both personal and environmental weather and constant change. Editing becomes a collaborative process of distillation. Their work is informed by Anna Halprin's Life/Art Process, in which they both trained. Equal weight is given to the human being/body in motion, the moving eye of the camera and the environment.

As a performer and director **Helen Poyner** specialises in site-specific and autobiographical performance. She runs the *Walk of Life Workshop* and Training Programme in nonstylised and environmental movement on the Jurassic Coast in South West England. She is a registered Dance Movement Therapist. Her essay *'Landscapes of loss: Moving and mourning'* (JDSP Vol 5 No 2 2013) recounts the five year process of working with grief that culminated in *In Memoriam*.

Annie Pfingst's film-making arises from an arts practice that works with the dynamic interplay between spatiality and materiality, between the visual and the kinaesthetic. Her work as an artist/scholar which includes exhibitions and visual essays, examines landscapes of dispossession, technologies of oppression and the legacies of expulsions, state violence and collective loss.

Ceara Conway

Ceara Conway is an Irish visual artist and singer. She produces experiential performance works that utilise elements such as live singing, video and visual art to explore social experiences of power and loss in response to issues such as exile and migration. She is artist in residence with Ormston House Cultural Centre and holds a studio award with Dance Limerick. Select works include Hope, Oireachtas na Gaeilge (2018), The Barbican (2018), Mountains to Sea Festival (2018). Time. Ulster Museum



(2017), DUBH, EVA International Biennale (2016), Making Visible, IMMA (2015). She is currently producing her first album CAOIN.

Alex Reuben

Alex Reuben has a background as a DJ and in art and design. He makes movies characterised by improvisation, dance and music which have been exhibited by Picturehouse, Curzon and BFI Cinemas. Reuben's 'Routes' was selected in the 'Top 20 Movies of the Decade' (Geoff Andrew). Commissions include Sadler's Wells, Channel 4 and the BBC with awards from ACE, Jerwood and Dance Digital. His movies explore the connections between art, science and politics in the choreography of the environment

In this presentation, Jenny Roche will discuss experiences of collaborating as a dancer across a range of film projects, including with choreographers Liz Roche, Rosemary Butcher and recently, with Carol Brown, Ruth Gibson and Bruno Martelli on WAHAWAEWAO. She will outline some of the insights gleaned from inhabiting a 'mediated body' and the dancing practices that evolved when shifting from the ephemerality of live performance to the (often) fragmented flow of choreographic filmmaking.

Jenny Roche (PhD) is a Senior Lecturer in Contemporary Dance and the Course Director of the MA in Contemporary Dance Performance at the University of Limerick, Ireland, She was previously based at Queensland University of Technology, Brisbane (2013 - 2017). Her research focus is the creative practice of the contemporary dancer, exploring the specific nuances of this career from multiple perspectives including philosophical approaches, Somatics and narrative enquiry. She has worked extensively as a dancer in Ireland and internationally, and continues to work as a collaborator and performer in various creative arts research contexts. Her book Multiplicity, Embodiment and the Contemporary Dancer: Moving Identities was published in 2015.

Thinking around all the concepts of VR and surveillance and combining it with an interest in rematerialisation led Gibson and Martelli to make a collaborative project with Susan Kozel that came out of discussion about encryption and privacy and then became about digital archiving.

We Are Here And We Are Everywhere At Once

Following on from a residency in New Zealand, WAHAWAEWAO began with experiments with performers experiencing virtual landscapes inside the mocap lab and motion-capturing their responses to these ersatz terrains. (We Are Here And We Are Everywhere At Once will be screened in Programme 4 on Saturday 10 November, see page 16 for details).

Capture the Flag

The original concept for Capture the Flag was to create a flag for VR – a metaphor for the uncontested territory of cyberspace. During development some kind of error in attaching the cloth to a physics simulation caused it to exhibit an unplanned behaviour, it appeared to run away. The duo decided the poetic solution was to keep it, merely adding a following 3rd person camera viewpoint framing the flag in an ever-changing, never-ending shot.

Gibson/Martelli will also lead the Light Moves Professional Lab, Monday 12 - Wednesday 14 November, see pages 34 & 35 for details.

British electronic arts duo **Gibson / Martelli** make live simulations using performance capture, computer generated models and an array of technologies including Virtual Reality. Artworks of infinite duration are built within game engines where surround sound heightens the sense of immersion. Playfully addressing the position of the self, the artists examine ideas of player, performer and visitor – intertwining familiar tropes of videogames and art traditions of figure & landscape. LIGHT MOVES LAB is a three-day workshop that invites participants to experience the exciting potential of immersive technologies that are becoming ever more available across the arts and society. The Lab is open to **dancers, choreographers, media artists** and **film-makers**. It will introduce these technologies and open the door to the many possibilities that are emerging across and between these disciplines.

ALTERED STATES, ALTERNATE LANDSCAPES MOCAP + VIRTUAL REALITY WORKSHOP WITH RUTH GIBSON AND BRUNO MARTELLI

Altered States, Alternate Landscapes shares artists Gibson/Martelli's research and process in works such as Falling Upwards and MAN A VR. The workshop opens kinaesthetic awareness through self-exploration and active engagement in Motion Capture & Virtual Realities channelling the teaching and philosophy of Skinner Releasing Dance Technique. Participants will experience and experiment with performance technologies to discover how we respond to ourselves, others and environments in these 'new spaces'.

An invitation to play, explore, record, draw and move in and around these new spaces afforded by Mixed Realities. Felt experience in new landscapes, sensations, affect, perceptions in a new arena permits, prompts new configurations, articulations, shifts in the imaginary. Performance in immersive

experiences questions the role of the somatic in digital environments. Altered States allows for new approaches and new ideas in an expanding choreographic field.

This practical workshop begins with simple VR drawing packages which capture movement as non-temporal sequences. Gibson/Martelli will demonstrate how different packages can be used to create virtual environments. Building onto this, participants will get hands-on experience with motion capture in order to record their own sequences. Gibson/Martelli offer practical advice on preparing for performance capture sessions with commercial studios to minimise costs. Participants will be encouraged to improvise in the system, responding to virtual environments with a view to creating new virtual environments.



Bruno Martelli graduated from Central Saint Martins and **Ruth Gibson** from University of Kent at Canterbury. Their worldwide commissions include residencies in North America, China, Australia and New Zealand and exhibitions at The Barbican, Detroit Institute for Art, and the Venice Biennale. Solo shows include *Big Bob* (2015) at Jaffe-Friede Gallery in Hanover, USA, *MAN A* (2015) at UNION gallery, London and *80°N* (2014) at QUAD Gallery in Derby. They have exhibited in London in group shows: *This Is Where We Came In* (2018) at Angus Hughes Gallery, *Complicity, Artifice & Illusion* (2016) at Collyer Bristow Gallery, *Splintered Binary* (2017) at Gossamer Fog and *Now Play This* (2017) at Somerset House. Nominated for a British Academy of

Film & Television Arts (BAFTA) the duo are recipients of several awards: a Henry Moore Foundation New Commission, a National Endowment for Science Technology and the Arts (NESTA) Award and in 2015 they won the Lumen Gold Prize. During 2017 they were resident artists at Great Ormond Street Hospital exploring the potential and benefits of augmented and virtual reality in a hospital setting. Their most recent project *Reality Remix* completes the first stage of a Next Generation of Immersive Experiences award funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council & Engineering and Physical Sciences Council. Gibson is the Creative Fellow at Centre for Dance Research at Coventry University. The artists live and work in London.




